Kin Canada Acronyms

When talking with one another, the use of acronyms by members of Kin has become the norm. These shortened versions of Kin terminology may be recognizable to those who have been in the Association for a number of years but to a new member or to the general public, the acronyms may sound odd.

Listed below are the most common Kin acronyms. While these may still be in use, it is recommended that members of Kin use the full terms whether at club, zone, district and national events or when speaking with the general public.

Kin Canada Customs

1. Kin Canada was founded by Hal Rogers in 1920. Hal was a military man and a piece of Kin Canada we still have today is a **sergeant-at-arms** or sometimes more commonly known as a “**finer master.**” In some clubs, at District and National events you may see someone collecting money for “infractions” (i.e. not wearing your name badge, not wearing a Kin shirt etc.), this is a light hearted way to raise money and poke fun that seems to be unique to Kin Canada.
2. Alongside this at meetings, you may also be “fined” for an incorrect **address to the chair.** The chair of the meeting is the club President and they will set a saying to be repeated before any comments are made in meeting to the chair or group. This address is typically standard but many Presidents have a little fun, and add on a unique closing to the address, for example: “President John, honoured guests and fellow Kin, bring on summer!”
3. The “**Good of Kin**” is another custom you may experience at a club meeting. This typically happens at the end of the meeting where everyone is given the chance to speak and thank someone, bring up important information, share about yourself etc. This practice is done to bring members closer together, share good stories, struggles and life events among the club.

Kin Canada Traditions

The Canadian national anthem and the Kin song (including joining hands during the Kin song) are traditionally sung before all meetings but this is decided upon on a club to club basis, every club is different! The expression of gratitude is a non-denomination address that some clubs will say before a meal at a meeting, or the alternative is the more traditional Kin Grace, this goes along with the toast to the Association. Below are the versions of the Kin song, expression, grace, Canadian national anthem, and toast you might come across:

From the map graphic above you have seen that Canada is divided into:

Districts

There are 8 Districts across the country. Each District is led by an elected District Governor (volunteer leader). The District executive team includes Vice Governors, Deputy Governors and committees, all of which support the service clubs.

Zones

District are sectioned off further into 54 Zones within each District. Elected Deputy Governors oversee Zone operations. Each zone contains a small number of clubs.

Clubs

Kinsmen and Kinettes are members of approximately 466 Kinsmen, Kinette and Kin clubs that belong to the National Association of Kin Canada. Each club decides what causes to support through fundraisers and community service projects.

Every year, clubs elect an executive team that consists of a President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. Many clubs will also include a Registrar and Bulletin Editor(s). The role of the executive team is to manage the operational details of the club. The Club President also acts as the liaison between the club and the Zone Deputy Governor. National Head Office

Kin Canada's headquarters is located in Cambridge, Ontario. 8 full-time and 1 part-time staff provide administrative services to the clubs. Grant Ferron is the Executive Director. He represents the paid staff, and ensures the Association moves toward its mission and objects in the most efficient and cost-effective manner.
